I. Guest Speaker

Toni Davis-Spivey, Foreclosure Program Coordinator (“We are Family” Community Development Cooperation). “We are Family” offers several different services to help you with BGE bills, food bank, rental assistance, pre-purchase counseling, foreclosure intervention and budgeting. All services are free of charge and are for the following zip codes: 21133, 21117, 21136, 21107, 21108 and 21144. The office is located at 8611 Church Lane and telephone number is 410-922-9623. Their office hours are 8:30am-4:30pm (Monday-Friday)-.

II. Meeting Called to Order

President Keith Dyson called the meeting to order at 7:45pm, after the guest speaker’s presentation.

III. Reading of Minutes

The minutes for the September 2009 General Meeting were read by Recording Secretary Jacqueline Crosby and accepted as read.

IV. Financial Report & 2010 Proposed Budget

As of March 15, 2010, the balance of the Kings Park Association (KPA) treasury is \$3,449.60. Treasurer Delores Ford read the report and proposed budget. Both were accepted as read.

V. Old Business

- A. Citizens on Patrol (COP) - COP has grown to 23 members. Last year, there were 34 violations in the community and 30 were resolved. To date, nine cases are pending resolution. On January 13, 2010 there was an armed robbery at Templar and Marriottsville Roads. The suspects were apprehended. On March 8, 2010, there was a disagreement between two groups of teenagers at Live Oak and Marriottsville Roads. One of the teens received a small cut from a knife. The teens were questioned by the police, but the teens were uncooperative. The rest of the violations were untagged vehicles in driveways and residents not maintaining their property and/or lawns. There is a concern about the amount of trash on certain streets and Keith will get together with other communities to try to do something about the trash. If interested in helping with the cleanup, see Clarence Wilson. Madison Crosby informed us that at the recent Police Community Relations Council meeting, it was reported that all crime categories in Baltimore County is down except burglaries. There were some complaints about Skateworks and reports of violence amongst the teenagers. Also, there have been spottings of tennis shoes put on the electrical wires. If you notice them, call BGE at 410 685-0123 and they will be taken down. There will be a meeting called “Community Against Violence” on April 22, 2010 at 7PM at the Randallstown Community Center (RCC).
- B. KPA Bylaws – The revised bylaws, approved at the September general meeting, have been filed with Baltimore County.

VI. New Business

- A. 2010 KPA Membership Drive – The membership drive starts April 1, 2010 and continues through May 31, 2010. Last year we achieved 73.8% membership rate. The goal this year is 80%.
- B. Financial Audit - A financial audit was conducted in January 2010 of KPA records for the period June 30, 2009 - December 31, 2009. All records were in order. Keith thanked Delores (Treasurer) for an excellent job. If anyone is interested in participating in future audits, contact Keith.
- C. Spring Community Clean Up – The community cleanup may not be until July/August this year due to funding.
- D. KPA Website (www.kingspark21133.org) - Keith reminded everyone to check the KPA website weekly for vital information. Since we are going “green”, there is a lot of information on the website including current events and news articles impacting the Kings Park Community.
- E. Miscellaneous
 - a. In the next newsletter, we will have a list of Kings Park’s 2010 graduates with their future plans.
 - b. If anyone is interested in becoming a KPA Board member, see Keith. There is a vacancy.
 - c. For the 2010 census, there was a meeting at Rising Sun Baptist Church. After April 1st, if you have not filled out and sent back the census, a Census representative will come to your home. Census employment opportunities are available ranging from \$15-\$19 per hour. For these employment opportunities, call 1-866- 861-2010.
 - d. The RCC is up and running. Keith is on the RCC Advisory Board (RCCAB) and welcomes the community’s input about activities you would like to see at the center. Also, please inform Keith of any issues about the center and

he will discuss with the RCCAB. Also, he will check about computer room use for residents. There are different classes and events being held at RCC. The schedule is posted on KPA's website.

- e. October is "Domestic Violence Awareness" month. Peggy Araya (Kings Park COP member) is a former head of the Domestic Violence Unit at the Maryland Division of Parole and Probation. Peggy is coordinating an event on Saturday, October 9, 2010 at the RCC (1pm-3pm) to distribute pamphlets and answer questions about domestic violence.

Questions and Concerns

- a. A Community Document Shred Day event was requested for Kings Park. Keith will look into it, especially if we receive grant money. Stella Adams and Walter Johnson volunteered to look into this event costs.
- b. Some of the areas in Kings Park are very dark. The Department of Public Works (DPW) says that if we get a petition from the neighborhood they will interview residents to find out if we are able to get street lights. If interested, contact DPW at 410-887-3300.
- c. Residents were pleased with how well the community was plowed out. A letter on behalf of our community will be sent by Keith to DPW.
- d. There was a meeting about the satellite branch of Baltimore Community College to be located in the former Giant Food Store on Offutt Road. No date yet on when Wal-Mart is coming. Owings Mills Mall is about 90% empty so we need businesses in the community.
- e. If you had any property damaged during the DPW snow removal, please call 410-887-8402.

Citizens on Patrol (C.O.P.)

Our C.O.P. group has increased to 22 members; however, we can still use more. If you are interested please contact Clarence Wilson, C.O.P. Director at 410-655-4259 or email at clarence.wilson@kingspark21133.org.

A two-hour training class is required at the Baltimore County Police Department.

The C.O.P. goal for 2010 has not changed - we want a community that shows exemplary care of our homes and properties, and is safe and crime free. These are the things that will keep our home values up. Let's protect our investments.

In 2009, there were a total of 34 code violation cases. Thirty cases were closed. Of the 30 cases, 23 were closed with only a letter from the Kings Park Association to alert the neighbor of the violation; the other 11 cases had to be referred to Code Enforcement. Seven of the 11 referred cases were closed and the remaining 4 cases were carried over to 2010. So far, in 2010 we have 19 violations including the carryover from 2009 with 11 cases resolved. Listed are the types of violations cited:

- 30, expired and/or no tags on vehicles in driveways or yard
- 6, tall grass
- 5, neglected maintenance on exterior of house
- 3, junk & debris on property
- 3, overgrown shrubbery
- 2, auto repairs on property.

Mobile Career Center

State and federal representatives dedicated a new fully equipped, state-of-the-art Mobile Career Center. The Mobile Career Center (MCC) will be primarily used to provide job search assistance for persons re-entering the job market. The MCC will make visits in the community, county offices and other locations to assist individuals. The MCC is a one-stop career center with computer stations, the Internet, phone and fax service and the hands on experience of professionally trained workforce development staff.

Vacant Giant Market

Approval was received for a 10-year, \$5.9 million lease for the 39,000 square foot formerly vacant Giant Food Market, located in the Randallstown Plaza Shopping Center. The building will house the Office of Workforce Development, the Department of Social Services, the Office of Sustainability, and the Community College of Baltimore County. The agencies will jointly use the premises for administrative offices, classroom space, trade school training, and other governmental uses. Opening of this new center is anticipated to begin in the fall of 2010.

Speed Cameras

The County Council passed legislation authorizing the use of speed cameras in school zones in Baltimore County. The speed cameras will operate Monday through Friday, from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The ticket is civil and the fine is \$40 with no points. Tickets will be issued to those motorists traveling at least 12 miles per hours over the posted speed limit. The cameras will also be in operation in the summer months to

protect summer school students. The locations of the cameras in District 4 are:

Owings Mills Farm Development Plans

About 30 people gathered at the Randallstown Community Center last week to look at new plans to transform an Owings Mills farm into a mix of high-density housing, shops, a school and park.

The 105-acre property is in the 9400 block of Lyons Mill Road, just south of Owings Mills Boulevard.

Two years ago a plan was submitted to the county to build 750 housing units there, including townhouses and condominiums, 24,000-square-feet of offices and shops, a pool, clubhouse and open space. The development was then known as Plinlimmon Farm, named after the early 1800s farmhouse on the parcel.

Following public opposition, plans were downsized to 646 units. In November 2008, the county planning office put the brakes on the project to consider whether part of the acreage should be set aside for a public school.

At the beginning of this year, property owner Ballard Family LLC brought in new developers who came up with a different concept plan that was submitted to County Council for review as a Planned Unit Development (PUD). A PUD designation permits more housing units than standard county zoning allows, while overlaying certain restrictions and criteria regarding the type and quality of development.

The new site plans were developed by Morris & Ritchie Associates, a Laurel engineering firm, and Gaylord/Brooks Realty Co. of Jarrettsville.

The new plans call for 521 housing units to meet minimum LEED certification standards for neighborhood development. The LEED (Leadership in Energy &

Environmental Design) organization promotes green building and smart growth practices.

Of those 521 units, there are to be 186 rear-garage townhomes, 191 front-garage townhomes and 98 condominiums.

In addition, plans call for 46 so-called live/work units.

"Somebody would buy the unit, and ideally, open up the business on the first floors and live on the third floor," said Sean Davis of Morris & Ritchie.

He said the mix of housing types was chosen to appeal to young executives and empty-nesters and that the design promotes walking and biking.

The development plans include a community center, swimming pool and tot lot.

Stephen R. Smith, president of Gaylord/Brooks, said the centerpiece of the plan is a 700-seat elementary school and park set on 17 acres fronting Lyons Mill Road. The park is to include athletic fields.

"The county has determined a tremendous need for that in this community," Smith said.

The county has envisioned that a new elementary school, not a middle or high school, would be needed based on current and projected enrollments at nearby schools.

Smith said existing historic structures on the farm, including the Ballard house, a tenant house, and smoke house are to be preserved. He wasn't sure whether a corn crib would stay.

In addition, more than 581,000 square feet of open space is in the plan, about 60,000 square feet more than the county requires.

Residents of adjacent neighborhoods, including Lyonswood to the east and south and Whitehurst to the west, raised concerns about noise and dust during construction, major gas lines crossing the Ballard property, cutting down stands of old trees, and if new home designs would fit with surrounding homes.

"In regards to the live/work units, is there going to be some kind of control over the type of businesses?" Stan Levin of Owings Mills New Town asked. "And will the owner of the business be required to live above the business?"

Smith said that the PUD has certain restrictions on types of uses allowed and that county codes and zoning also restricts or prohibits certain kinds of uses in residential areas.

In answer to a question about the price range of the proposed homes, Smith said he estimated the starting prices at \$300,000 to \$400,000, keeping in mind the current unstable housing market.

Clay Troy, who has lived on Lyonswood Road for nine years, is one of 15 homeowners whose yards abut the western property line of the Ballard Farm development and the back of a group of proposed townhouses.

"It's extremely important to us to have a wooded buffer, a mature stand of specimen trees, to provide a privacy screen between the old and new development," Troy said. "That's extremely important to us, and the proposed distance to our property line."

Davis said plans did call for removing existing trees and planting new, but said that developers would look at the possibility of saving existing trees for the required forest buffer.

Smith said that if the planning process moves forward without any major delays, developers would like to break ground in late 2011 or the spring of 2012.

Smith has been holding monthly meetings with community associations about the plan. The next meeting is scheduled for Aug. 4, at 7 p.m. at the Randallstown Community Center.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

Building a Community, one neighborhood at a time. . .

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT is an annual event celebrated throughout the nation. The event was introduced by the National Association of Town Watch in 1984 to heighten awareness and strengthen participation in local anti-crime efforts.
